# THINGS YOUCAND TO REDUCE THE SPREAD OF RAPID 'ÖHI'A DEATH



## AVOID INJURING 'ŌHI'A

Wounds serve as entry points for the fungi and increase the odds that the tree will become infected and die from ROD. Avoid pruning and contact with heavy equipment wherever possible.



## 2 DON'T TRANSPORT 'ŌHI'A INTER-ISLAND

Comply with the new quarantine rule to help prevent ROD from spreading. Don't move 'ōhi'a plants, whole or parts, 'ōhi'a wood, or soil from Hawai'i Island without a permit.



### DON'T MOVE 'ŌHI'A

Do not move 'ōhi'a wood, firewood, or posts, especially from an area known to have ROD. If you don't know where the wood is from, don't move it and keep it out of the greenwaste.



## **CLEAN YOUR GEAR/TOOLS**

If you must work around or cut 'ōhi'a, clean tools and gear before and after use, especially when used on infected 'ōhi'a. Brush all soil off of tools and gear, then spray with 70% rubbing alcohol. Shoes and clothes should also be cleaned before and after entering forests. Wash clothes with hot water and soap.



### **WASH YOUR VEHICLE**

Wash the tires and undercarriage of your vehicle with detergent and remove all soil or mud, especially after traveling from an area with ROD and/or if you have traveled off-road.



A disease that is new to science and new to Hawai'i has killed hundreds thousands of 'ōhi'a trees (Metrosideros polymorpha) across thousands of acres on Hawai'i Island. Known as Rapid 'Ōhi'a Death (ROD), it is caused by a fungus called Ceratocystis. We can all help minimize further spread, and buy time to help researchers find answers and potential treatments.

#### SYMPTOMS

- weeks; dead leaves remain on branches for some time.
- Sometimes, single branches or limbs turn rest of the tree turns brown.
- All ages of 'ōhi'a trees can be affected and can have symptoms of browning of branches and/or leaves.
- If a tree with ROD is cut down, or a section of the tree is removed, the fungus shows up as dark staining in the sapwood along the outer edge, and there may be an over-ripe fruit-like odor.
- A tree may be infected for months or longer before we can see outward signs of infection.

#### **QUARANTINE RIII F**

The Hawai'i Department of Agriculture passed a permanent quarantine rule that prohibits interisland movement except by permit of all 'ōhi'a plants or plant parts, including:

- Logs, wood, twigs, flowers, leaves, seeds, stems, cuttings
- Unfinished 'ōhi'a wood and wood products
- Green waste, mulch, sawdust, wood chips and frass (wood dust from boring beetles)
- Soil
